Making Comparisons

How do we compare one thing with two or more other things? In English, we use the comparative and the superlative with adjectives, adverbs and nouns.

Comparing Objects Using Adjectives and Adverbs

Simple	Comparative	Superlative
small	smaller	smallest
big	bigger	biggest
good	better	best
slow		
fast		
tall		

Example: His new apartment is so small/big!

Example: Your old apartment is smaller/bigger than your last one.

Example: Your living room is the smallest/biggest of all the other living rooms in this

building.

Comparing Objects Using Nouns

For Count Nouns

Comparative Superlative

more the most fewer the fewest

Our old house had more/fewer bathrooms than our last one.

This townhouse has the fewest/the most windows of all the townhouses on our block.

For Non-Count Nouns

Comparative Superlative

more the most less the least

Our new farm has more/less land than our old one.

Your condominium gets the least/the most sunlight.

Spelling Rules for Short Adjectives and Adverbs

Rule	Simple	Comparative	Superlative
Add –er and –est to	tall	taller	tallest
For adjectives that end in y, change y to i and add-er and -est	fast easy happy	faster easier happier	fastest easiest happiest
For adjectives that end in <i>e</i> , add – <i>r</i> and – <i>st</i>	nice late	nicer later	nicest latest
For words ending in consonant-vowel-consonant, double the final consonant, then add -er and -est. Exception: Do not double the final w: new, newer, newest	big sad	bigger sadder	biggest saddest
