Asking Questions

"What?" Questions

What + be + subject

Example:

Question (Singular): What is the address of your employer?

Sentence (Singular): The address of my employer is 4251 Main Street.

Question (Plural): What are your hours this week?

Sentence (Singular): My hours this week are 9-5:30 Tuesday through Saturday.

What + helping verb "do" + subject + main verb

Example:

Question (Singular): What did Carla buy with her last paycheck?

Sentence (Singular): Carla bought a new computer program with her last paycheck.

Question (Plural): What did they put on the bulletin board? Sentence (Singular): They put a notice on the bulletin board.

"Where?" Questions

$$Where + be + subject$$

Example:

Question (Singular): Where is the manager's office?

Sentence (Singular): The manager's office is through that door on the left.

Question (Plural): Where are the payroll files?

Sentence (Singular): The payroll files are in the third drawer from the top.

Where + do + subject + main verb

Example:

Question (Singular): Where does he work?

Sentence (Singular): He works at Rowe Furniture in Roanoke.

Question (Plural): Where do you jog in the mornings before work?

Sentence (Singular): I jog around the block in the mornings before work.
