

LVRV Enters the Workplace

According to the National Institute for Literacy's *Fact Sheet on Workforce Literacy*, workplace literacy needs continue to grow among American employers. Topping the list of critical employment competencies are verbal communication skills (86%) and interpersonal skills (77%). Sadly, the American Management Association's 2001 survey of American firms determined that more than 34% of applicants lacked the skills necessary to perform the jobs they sought. When one adds the commonly accepted wisdom that a 10% increase in workers' education results in a productivity increase of more than 8%, it is clear that employers have a vested interest in workplace literacy issues.

Literacy Volunteers of Roanoke Valley's recent collaboration with Salem Preferred Partners is the result of this nationwide trend. Since mid-January, Adult Programs Coordinator Bill Van Velzer has been conducting classes twice a week at the SPP worksite. The 16 enrolled students are all foreign-born employees who assemble axles and motors for Mack and Volvo trucks. The class contains a wide array of student abilities, from literacy to low-advanced levels.

Curriculum design has been the most challenging feature of this new endeavor. The presence of many different language abilities has required a differentiated approach to instruction, which Bill brings to the classroom from his experience with teaching gifted students in the public schools. As a result, students routinely work in pairs and small groups in addition to receiving whole-group instruction. The key to this method has been to assign a single concept to each class session, which is then "layered" to fit the needs of this diverse set of learners. The need for thorough planning is evident.

Differentiated instruction accounts for much of the success of LVRV's first foray into the world of workplace education. Yet there is another critical component: relevancy. Like any business, SPP views its workplace literacy program as an investment in improving their bottom line. Management is acutely aware of the connection between communication skills and productivity, especially when a significant number of SPP assembly line workers have limited English skills. The classroom curriculum reflects this by using materials commonly found on the job site. From employment policies and safety practices to the process manufacturing sheets and "Q Tickets" that direct assembly line operations, students are surrounded by the familiar while they explore the unknown. This method of weaving English language skills through an existing web of workplace vocabulary has enabled students to make rapid progress.

Literacy Volunteers looks forward to broadening its relationship with the local business community thrugh its English language services. If the experience with Salem Preferred Partners is any indication, the future holds real promise for the expansion and adaptation of LVRV's traditional services into the exciting world of workplace literacy.

Pronunciation tip:/b/and/v/

Key word for the /b/ sound is *bat*. Key word for the /v/ sound is *van*.

Pat Kniffel; 1 Year – Lorah Igo.

The /b/ sound pushes the bottom lip forward and out in a "pouting manner." The inside of the bottom lip slightly covers the lower front line of the top lip, pulls the lips together and push out. No teeth are involved.

The /v/ sound pulls the corners of the mouth horizontally in a "flat" manner.

The teeth are resting on the bottom lip with vibration occurring across the lip. The two front teeth are showing some.

Put your index fingers in your ears and play with the sound of /b/ and /v/.
