LVRV's First Annual Scrabble Tournament Raises \$11,800 to Support Literacy Efforts in the Roanoke Valley



Literacy Volunteers of Roanoke Valley wishes to thank the more than 130 scrabble heads who convened at Roanoke's Jefferson Center on March 23rd for LVRV's First Annual Scrabble Tournament. Joe Kennedy from *The Roanoke Times* led forty-four teams of three in two brain-teasing rounds of competition for prizes ranging from \$50 Barnes & Noble gift certificates for the six players of the two winning teams (one of which scored more than 400 points!) to a round of golf for four at Westlake Country Club for the most outrageous word played. Members of the low-scoring teams from each round were presented with Official Scrabble dictionaries to make them competition-tough for next spring's Second Annual Scrabble Tournament.

Participants that evening came to have fun and compete! One team member called the office to ask which edition of the Scrabble dictionary we were using the night of the event! Tips for LD Readers

While reading a passage, allow the learner to use a finger to track the sentence. A plain book mark, a piece of paper, or a translucent, color-tinted plastic overlay may also help with eye distractions and muscular coordination.

Watch your learner's eyes as they move across the page. Is the movement choppy and shifty or is it smooth and orderly? If choppy and shifty, suggest eye sweeping exercises. Three "sweeps" of movement – left, middle, and right – "chunking" the words into a "wide angle"approach to brain input. By underlining the group of words to read as a "chunk", the learner can practice the eye movement and the intake of several words at a time. Allow the learner to use his or her book mark or lay the pencil flat, to again track the movement in three sweeps while reading. Practice, practice, practice the eye movements before worrying about the actual comprehension of content. This strategy will increase the speed of reading, and mature the ability to comprehend the text at a faster rate.

Be aware of what you casually say to your learner and how it may make them feel!

Has anyone ever said to you, "Come on, I know you can do it!" You hesitantly attempt and then fail, saying to yourself, "No, I cannot, can't you see!" or "I told you I cannot and you did not listen" or "I must be really stupid for not being able to do this."

As we encourage our learners to progress, we need to make sure we are not discouraging them with well-intentioned praise and encouragement that makes **us** feel good. We serve as tutor, leader and facilitator, and we need to know what the learner cannot do. That makes the learner feel secure. Knowing you have an understanding of what the learner needs to work on builds his or her confidence in you. Otherwise, the learner may say to himself, "this person has no idea about my learning challenges."

May I encourage you to pre-assess your learner to find out what he or she does not know. Plan the lesson, acknowledge the difficulty of the task, be careful of shallow cheerleading, use guided practice often, and use independent practice sparingly. Keep the independent practice to a few selections to build confidence – then repeat the process often.
